#### **1 POLICY STATEMENT**

- 1.1 This policy defines Thirteen's commitment to ensuring that its activities are not detrimental to the environment, that it takes positive steps to minimise the impact of their activities and to demonstrate they comply with the legislative requirements whilst demonstrating best practice.
- 1.2 It confirms the expectations from staff and stakeholders and the document articulates to external bodies Thirteen's stance with regards to our commitment to reduce our impact on the environment.
- 1.3 Through this policy and associated procedures and guidance, Thirteen seeks to demonstrate a managed and transparent approach to its legislative compliance with regards to environmental risk.
- 1.4 The contents of this policy, and associated guidance are applicable to all Thirteen's operations, offices, sites, and other assets and are governed by legislation, regional. commitments and financial and stakeholder pressure.
- 1.5 The policy will be adapted to respond to future legislative or regulatory changes with considerations for business continuity and maximising opportunities for service investments and improvements.

#### **4 POLICY CONTENTS**

- 4.1 Thirteen recognises that its activities, products and services have the potential to give rise to aspects that have a detrimental impact on the environment. Thirteen is committed to improving the environmental impact and sustainability of their activities and operations for the benefit of the customer, the business and the planet.
- 4.2 Understanding the significant impact business activity has on climate change, and as part of a continuous improvement plan, Thirteen will seek to ensure improvement of environmental performance through a robust programme of environmental objectives and targets. These include a reduction in CO2 emissions from all contributing operational activity.
- 4.3 Environmental improvements are integrated into business planning and decision making to ensure that sustainability is not separated from core business activity but forms part of a balanced overall strategy to achieve Thirteen's environmental goals.
- 4.4 A comprehensive legal register will be kept and regularly updated and utilised through the introduction of an Environmental Management System.
- 4.5 Thirteen will monitor the external environment for changes in relation to the effect of climate change, energy, resource security and associated costs for potential impacts on our business activity and approach, and where necessary introduce proportionate mitigating actions.
- 4.6 As a minimum Thirteen commit to key performance indicators and a reporting frequency aligned with associated legislation, regulations and approved code of practice requirements.

We will ensure this policy is supported by appropriate procedures, controls and transparent record keeping that will be subject to audit as required.

#### 5 QUALIFICATIONS AND TRAINING

5.1 Thirteen will provide training and guidance appropriate to the roles and responsibilities including for colleagues and stakeholders with direct roles assisting in the delivery of the Environmental policy, nominated responsible persons and others with delegated environmental protection duties.

5.2 Education and awareness raising will be delivered to assist staff and stakeholders understanding the environmental impacts of their activities and how they can contribute to minimise their own impacts and influence their behaviour. This will enhance our social contribution as our staff and stakeholders take this learning and apply it outside of the business activities.

#### **6** COMMUNICATION

- 6.1 Thirteen commits to communicate with employees and stakeholders all appropriate environmental information on a regular basis through any available media sources necessary, including, but not inclusive of, publications, newsletters, group meetings, and via the Thirteen website.
- 6.2 Thirteen will liaise with the Environmental agency and neighbouring local authorities, Frequently engaging in effective two-way communication to ensure effective operational practices for environmental protection in an aligned approach.

Monitoring and Review	This policy will be reviewed every three years from the approval date, or in-line with impacting corporate, legislative or regulatory change requirements. Reviews will be conducted by a competent delegate within Thirteen and submitted to Governance Team for corporate approval prior to publication. The supporting procedural documents can be updated at any
	time and the changes can be implemented following sign off from the service area Director or competent delegate within Thirteen.
	Key performance indicators associated with the compliance aspects of environmental protection will be monitored and reported internally utilising reporting mechanisms within our software packages.
	Where appropriate, valid certification will be issued for any environmental activity, and managed and stored in accordance with the Data Protection Act 2018.
